Description: Often, we are caught up with AI and what it brings to the table, but it's important to consider what it doesn't provide. I'd like to explore areas where AI falls short, like providing human connection and empathy, understanding students' emotions, struggles, and building trust.

Additionally, AI lacks cultural sensitivity and the ability to interpret nuanced language or expressions tied to specific cultures. It doesn't possess the ability to inspire or motivate in the way a passionate, dedicated teacher can. AI lacks any form of growth mindset.

Let's not lose sight of these things when using AI as a tool.

"Why AI helps teachers prepare students for exams"

Description: Dr. House said that everybody lies, and I will say that everyone cheats. The amount of ready-made homework does not give students a chance to complete the exercise on their own and teachers kill their free time inventing something new, unusual, to which there are no answers on the Internet. This is especially important for those who are preparing for exams. The temptation to look at the keys is too great, but it may cost the exam points. I will share my experience in using different AI tools and let your students think but not cheat.

We will not have an answer for every question, but I hope you will leave with a few new ideas about what it is you are actually teaching and how you are teaching it.

"Authentic insights vs. generative creativity: corpora and Al by Gabi Widurek in Business English Language instruction"



Description: This talk is an exploration of both themes: authentic insights from corpora and the creative potential of generative Al. It will provide a framework for discussing practical applications in the classroom. This approach underscores current trends in language education, where both authenticity and innovation are valued. By contrasting the use of authentic language data (corpora) with Al-generated content in teaching Business English, the talk will highlight a dual focus on "traditional", data-driven approaches, and innovative methods. This makes it appealing to educators interested in modern teaching strategies while also encouraging a critical stance on both.



Bio: Gabi is a PhD language researcher, content creator, and corpus linguistics enthusiast. She holds an MA in TESOL from University College Dublin, and she is pursuing a PhD in Linguistics at the same institution. With a background in sales, content creation, and brand management, she is dedicated to empowering multilingual users of English in business settings, as well as helping Business English teachers feel confident in reaching for authentic materials in their teaching practices.

"Beyond Presentations: Novel ways of assessing students' speaking skills"

Description: Presentations are often considered a valuable tool for assessing students' speaking skills. They are widely used in classrooms to test a range of criteria, such as, lexis, grammatical accuracy, task achievement, etc. However, while they are good indicators of one's ability to comprehend a topic, present their ideas & opinions on it, presentations mostly turn into a monologue with very little scope of it building into a productive discussion between students. Changes in the task itself along with modifications in the assessment rubric can possibly provide us with a novel and more useful way to evaluate the students' communication skills.

I graduated from UCD in 2020 and have worked in various schools and universities since, most recently managing the Evening Courses at Atlas Language School. In my spare time, I love to do yoga and read.

Drawing on the successful implementation of this model in China by GoMappEd, we demonstrate how AI can empower educators, not replace them. This balanced approach fosters innovation, engagement, and effective learning while keeping teachers and students at the heart of education.

"GenAl in EAP: International Foundation Programmes in Ireland"

Description: This presentation will investigate the role of Generative Artificial Intelligence (GenAI) in English for Academic Purposes (EAP), particularly within International Foundation Programmes (IFPs). It will examine the competencies that lecturers may require in relation to GenAI and consider relevant frameworks, such as those proposed by UNESCO (2024), which explore its potential role in pedagogy and professional development. The presentation will also reflect on the context of the Irish higher education system, highlighting key initiatives and challenges in teaching and learning. Finally, it will propose areas for further research into the pedagogical and practical implications of GenAI in EAP education.



Bio:George is a Lecturer in English for Academic Purposes (EAP) with experience across several high education institutions. He has designed and delivered various language programmes, including Foundation, Pre-sessional, In-sessional, and bespoke courses. He is currently undertaking a Doctorate in Education (EdD) in Digital Technologies at the University of Strathclyde.

"To Al or Not to Al: The role of Immediacy-based Teaching strategies in Balancing High-Tech and Low-Tech ELT"

Description: The presentation explores the role of verbal and nonverbal immediacy teaching strategies in balancing low-tech and high-tech approaches for effective English Language Teaching (ELT). It highlights how engagement differs in low-tech (e.g., teacher gestures, warm tones) and high-tech (e.g., Al chatbots, personalized feedback) environments but emphasizes that immediacy bridges the gap, fostering connection and participation. By combining strategies from both settings, such as a teacher's encouraging tone in virtual classrooms or Al tools with friendly interactions, educators can create engaging, inclusive learning experiences. The call to action urges prioritizing immediacy to ensure every learner feels connected and supported, regardless of the tools used.

Bio: Saqib Hussain is a PhD candidate at the University of Ljubljana, Slovenia, researching the impact of immediacy strategies on pre-service teachers' engagement with diverse learners. With an M.Phil in Education, M.Ed, and expertise in English Linguistics, TEFL, and content creation, Mr. Hussain is passionate about fostering inclusive, engaging learning environments through innovative teaching practices
